Starting a group

- ▶ Why?
 - Purpose / Aim

- ▶ Need?
 - ls there a need for a NEW group?
 - Are there other groups nearby or online

- Type of membership
 - ▶ Who will you hope to recruit to your group?

If you decide to start a NEW group

You will need a friend or two



Most of us need friends involved to:

- Enhance our vision for the group
- Help with organising the initial stages
- Provide contacts
- ▶ To bring their friends



Outline your aims

- ▶ Purpose of the Group
 - ► This only needs to be a general aim ... when the group has more members they will most likely reset the aims and goals

Initial event

- This is probably the BEST way to grow your membership quickly
- Dream a little about the type of event
- ▶Then ...
 - Decide on type of event that is within your means in practical terms
 - Financially & Organisationally

Hold a Public Event

- ▶ Purpose of the Public Event is to:
 - Draw a crowd of open-minded people
 - Gather names, emails and phone numbers of interested people in your community.
 - Raise some seed-funding for the group.

Public event with a well-known GUEST SPEAKER

Think about the audience ... your community, your future members

Hold your first meeting

- Do this within a week or two of your initial event
 - Outline your aims
 - Give opportunity for diversity of opinion ... but don't be entirely derailed or diverted ... this group is being formed for a purpose.
- Interest Sub-Groups
- These are an excellent way of accommodating various skills and interests

Ideas for interest Sub-Groups

- Letter writing
- Fund raising
- Media
- Facebook posts and other social media
- Campaigning
- Grandmothers' group
- Political lobbying, Local, State & Federal
- Detention = Onshore and Offshore Manus and Nauru contact
- Direct refugee support for refugees living in community
- ASRC contact
- Hosting weekend co-ordination
- English language support/teaching



- ► Keep GENERAL MEETINGS to as few as possible
 - maybe every 2 months
 - with SMALL INTEREST GROUP MEETINGS in between.
- Need at least one person steering the group initially with the strong support of a couple more.
- Be prepared for the long haul and disappointments.
- Establish the goals of the group early as it is easy to lose sight of this and become disillusioned by all the negativity.

Don't be afraid to start a new group

- Rural Australians for Refugees (RAR) is a national organisation of over
 90 groups with an average of 200 members per group
- RAR was established by 3 women sitting around a kitchen table

Points to remember

- Form a core group to help you get started
- Note the name, email and phone number of every interested person
- Holding a public event will give a major boost to membership
- Call your first meeting quickly to keep momentum
- Allow for various interests, skills, time, personalities, etc.
- Look for leaders within your group
- Establish the goals of your group early
